

On May 22, 2020, the now 1-year-old boy became the only child who was left at a Safe Haven Baby Box in Arkansas. The newborn was left at the Benton Fire Station, which was the first Safe Haven Baby Box location in Arkansas. The baby boy has since been adopted and is doing well. A Safe Haven Baby Box is designed to prevent illegal abandonment of newborn babies by providing a safe and anonymous way to surrender their child. Since the first Baby Box was installed in Benton, others have been installed in Rogers, Springdale, Jonesboro and Conway. The box, which is heated and air conditioned, is equipped with an alarm that alerts first responders that a baby has been surrendered. The Knights of Columbus have been raising money to have alert devices installed. The hope is that there will be a Baby Box in every population center in Arkansas.

Catholic Charities to Welcome 49 Afghan Refugees

It was announced last week that the Catholic Charities Refugee Resettlement Office will be responsible for assisting up to 49 refugees who fled Afghanistan after the U.S. withdrew and the Taliban took control of the country. A Lutheran refugee resettlement program will assist another 49 in NW Arkansas. The initial group in the United States will include 37,000 refugees moving to 46 states. The first refugees will arrive at the beginning of October. Resettlement takes about 6 to 12 weeks to complete.

Over the past 20 years, many of these refugees have worked for the U.S. military or the U.S. embassy in jobs such as interpreters. They are here legally, have the right to work, get a driver's license, serve in the military and travel and will be responsible for paying taxes. Bishop Taylor has called on us to show compassion to these people. "As Christians, we are called to do all we can to help our brothers and sisters in their time of need," he told *Arkansas Catholic*. "Moreover, most of us are ourselves, the descendants of immigrants who came to this country in their time of need. Having been given refuge here ourselves, at least in the person of our ancestors, we are all the more obligated to extend a welcome to immigrants today, and especially to refugees who often come here fleeing for their very lives."

There will be challenges to those who settle in central and northwest Arkansas, where the refugee resettlement programs are based. There is a housing shortage right now so finding permanent housing may be difficult. Plus they are going to need food, clothing and household goods in their new homes. Also, very few of the refugees will be able to speak English, so many translators will be needed. At this time no more than a dozen Afghans live in the northwest part of Arkansas. GIFTS

In today's readings, we discover that material wealth alone does not keep us from discipleship. We will see that there are other gifts more important than material wealth, but even so, it is how we use our gifts that matters most.

Today's scriptures point to the value of the gifts of wisdom, trusting in God, and letting our actions reflect the love of God from within. It is not gold that causes us to fall, but rather the desire for gold above all other things. From the readings in Wisdom and Hebrews, we find the source of God's gifts in our lives. Wisdom is more valuable than worldly possessions. In Hebrews, we are challenged to look at our own values and admit honestly what controls our lives.



FEAST OF FAITH

Agnus Dei

After the sign of peace, the priest breaks the host into pieces, and prepares the patens or plates of hosts for the assembly. In the early church, “the breaking of the bread” was the name given to the entire Eucharistic liturgy, so central was this action to the meaning of the Christian life. For just as the one bread is broken and given to many people, the many are made one in receiving it.

During this ritual action, we sing an ancient litany, calling on Jesus as the “Lamb of God”—the words used by John the Baptist when he pointed to Jesus walking beside the Jordan River (John 1:29, 36). In calling Jesus “the Lamb of God,” John was already pointing to the death that Jesus would die: in giving his life, Jesus would become the Paschal Lamb of the new covenant. During the Mass, when we call on the Lamb of God, we call to mind his self-sacrificing love, his blood poured out for us, and we ask this compassionate Lord for mercy and peace.
